Problems facing 911



Prior to 1968, there was no standard emergency phone number. You just called the local fire department or Andy Taylor and Barney Fife. In 1967, the FCC met with AT&T to establish a universal emergency number for the US. They wanted a number that was short and easy to remember, but it also had to be unique. 911 had never been designated for an office code, area code, or service code, so it was chosen. In the UK, you have to call 112 on a cell phone or 999 on a land line. In Australia, it's also 112 but 000 on a land line.
